The Death Penally and Combat Vets

At the sprawling Allan B. Polunsky Unit—which houses some 300 people on death row in Livingston, TX—John Darrell Thuesen awaits word of a Texas Court of Criminal Appeals ruling that he hopes will spare his life.

The appeal is being closely watched across the country. Before Thuesen, 30, was convicted on capital murder charges following a highly publicized trial in 2010, and became Inmate No. 99957, he was a decorated U.S. Marine lance corporal in Iraq, where he served from August 2004 to September 2005.

The trauma he suffered in combat, Thuesen argues, left him with impaired mental capacity—and should therefore exempt him from capital punishment.

Many legal experts agree.

For a brief moment, John Thuesen was able to smile. Pressing his hand against the glass, he sought out the warmth my hand could provide. My hand on the glass was his only way of "connecting" with another human being, he explained.


That was on the rare occasion he spent any time in the company of another human being. Locked inside an 8x10 cell in solitary confinement for 23 hours each day, Thuesen has little to do but to wrestle with his demons; his remorse; his grief. The 31-year-old man sitting on Texas death row barely resembled the 18-year-old who enthusiastically signed up for the Marines more than a decade ago. Growing up in a farming community in south Texas,




Robert Miller's father, World War II veteran Herbert Henry Miller, died in 1994. A month later, Robert and his mother discovered the Red Cross diary he had kept while a prisoner of war in Nazi Germany. It became the catalyst for Robert's quest to learn more about his father's war. The result of that quest is this remarkable book, a story of terror, horrific despair, and Nazi depravity. It is also a tale of survival against astonishing odds, of the deep bonds that develop between men at a time of war, and of choosing to leave hate behind.

Herbert Miller was twenty-one in February 1944 when he boarded the SS Argentina in Boston Harbor with the U.S. Army's 30th Infantry Division bound for the European war. Miller landed on Omaha Beach on June 11, five days after the mass assault of D-Day. The 30th moved inland, suffering enormous casualties in three primary operations. Captured by the Germans at Mortain, France, on August 6, Miller endured a punishing fifty-four-day march to Moosburg, Germany. He survived for seven months in Stalag VIIA, the largest POV camp in Nazi Germany.

During his stay at Stalag VIIA, Miller became good friends with a Nazi guard named Heinz. Heinz disappeared from the camp, and Miller always believed his fellow Nazis murdered him. His friendship with this kind and decent German man haunted Miller for the rest of his life.
